



 - •The B&NES Core
 Strategy must be in
 general conformity with
 the RSS

The Process so far





- Draft RSS published July 2006 for consultation
- B&NES Council agreed response
- EiP held April-June 2007
- EiP partial review of Gypsies & Travellers pitch requirements March 2008
- EiP Panel Reports published Jan 2008 & April 2008
- Government publish proposed changes 22 July 2008



Bath & North East Somerset Council

West of England Partnership Vision:

One of Europe's fastest growing and most prosperous sub regions which has closed the gap between disadvantaged and other communities – driven by major developments in employment and government backed infrastructure improvements in South Bristol and North Somerset.

Proposed Changes: New West of England Housing Market Area






New Planning Unit for allocation of jobs & homes

Plan for 137,950 homes (25% increase on 110,000 in draft RSS)

Plan for job growth of 137,200 (3.2% growth)

Key Diagram Inset 1 West of England Housing Market Area







Proposed Changes: Housing & Jobs requirement

- New Policy HMA1 requires 21,300 new homes in B&NES to be provided at rate of 1,065 per annum (37% increase on 15,500 in draft RSS)
- Job growth of 20,200 in Bath TTWA to be planned for, including 39 ha of employment land (Draft RSS requirement was 16 to 20,000 jobs)

Proposed Changes: Jobs requirement









Source of Housing Growth





Proposed Changes: Housebuilding Rates








Proposed Changes: Keynsham

- Development focussed on SSCTs Keynsham seen as 'functional part of Bristol SSCT'
- Expansion of 3,000 homes represents a 38% increase
- Green Belt implications (plus south east Bristol urban extension)
- Implications for infrastructure/services in town e.g. Education (eg Broadlands)
- Transport impacts esp. A4 Corridor
 - modelling work

Proposed Changes Implications: SE Bristol Urban Extension




- Environmental implications
- Delivery linked to infrastructure provision
- Major transport infrastructure –
 SE Bristol link road
- Other infrastructure –
 strengthens case for new
 secondary school in SE Bristol
- Need for joint working with Bristol CC increased













- Provision of 6,000 new homes plus job growth in the city – capacity issues
- Balanced approach reduce job growth vs. increase housing requirement
- Transport impacts Bath Package plus?
- Bath employment land figure





- Area of search defined may limit options
- Options best served by public transport are outside area of search
- Increase in size means greater environmental impact e.g. on setting of city
- Transport impacts to be assessed (alongside growth within Bath)



Proposed Changes: Infrastructure

- RSS does not identify strategic infrastructure eg transport outcomes included but <u>not</u> infrastructure facilities
- Not all education, health, cultural & tourist facilities can be delivered through developer contributions
- Core Strategy needs to be supported by delivery plan including infrastructure
- Phasing policy conflict with housing delivery rate

Proposed Changes: Summary of Issues

- Future rates of economic growth
- Capacity for new house-building rates
- Environmental implications of higher rate of growth
- Infrastructure provision
- Rate of housing growth/phasing
- Expansion at Keynsham contrary to thrust of spatial strategy/keep physically distinct
- Overall impact on the existing spatial strategy eg A4 corridor
- Review Area of Search for Bath Urban Extension

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
