



1 THE ISSUE

1.1 An application has been received from Robin Wood, Senior Trading Standards Officer, for a Review of a Premises Licence under section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003, in respect of Bright Stores, 16A Windsor Villas, Lower Weston, Bath BA1 3DJ.

2 **RECOMMENDATION**

2.1 That the sub committee determines the application to Review the Premises Licence.

3 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 There are no financial implications arising from this report.

4 THE REPORT

- 4.1 An application has been received for the Review of the Premises Licence (Annex A).
- 4.2 The application relates to the following licensing objectives, namely:

The Prevention of Crime & Disorder;

The Protection of Children from Harm.

The alleged grounds for the Review are:

- Sales of alcohol to children under the age of 18 undermining the licensing objectives of the Protection of Children from Harm and the Prevention of Crime and Disorder.
- Failed test purchase alcohol sold to a 16 year old boy on 10 February 2010
- Two failed test purchases alcohol sold to two different sixteen year old boys on 17 May 2010.
- 4.3 The Licensing Authority may, having had regard to the application and any relevant representations, take any of the following steps (if any) as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives:

a) Modify the conditions of the Licence;

- b) Exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the Licence;
- c) Remove the Designated Premises Supervisor;
- d) Suspend the Licence for a period not exceeding three months;

e) Revoke the Licence

Where the Licensing Authority takes a step mentioned in 4.3 (a) or (b), it may provide that the modification or exclusion is to have effect for only such period (not exceeding three months) as it may specify.

Any determination made by the Licensing Authority does not have effect until the end of the period given for appealing against the decision, or, if the decision is appealed against, until the appeal is disposed of.

- 4.4 The Licensing Authority will also have regard to the Council's Licensing Policy, the Statutory Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003, the Licensing Act itself, and, in particular, to:
 - a) Sections 4, 9, 10, 13, 51, 52, 53, 182, and 183 of the Act.
 - b) Chapters 8 -11 of the Statutory Guidance (as revised 28.06.2007)
 - c) Paragraphs 3, 5, 6, 15, 18 20, 24, 30, 33 37 and 40 45 inclusive, of the Policy.
- 4.5 An appeal may be made to the Magistrates Court within 21 days of the notification of the decision by the Council to the applicant for the review, the holder of the premises licence or any other person who made relevant representations in relation to the application.

On appeal the court may either dismiss the appeal, substitute the decision appealed against for any other decision which could have been made by the Licensing Authority, or remit the case to the Licensing Authority to dispose of it in accordance with the direction of the court. The court may make such Order for costs as it thinks fit.

- 4.6 The current Premises Licence (**Annex B**) permits the following licensable activities:
 - 1) The **Sale of Alcohol** for consumption **off** the premises only, between the following hours:

Every day 10:00 to 23:00

2) The **Opening hours** for the premises are:

Every day 06:00 to 23:00

3) The licence is subject to the following **conditions**:

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:

- a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- A CCTV camera shall be installed and maintained in full working order whilst the premises are open to the public. All recordings are to be kept for a minimum period of one month.
- Notices to be displayed prominently at the premises requesting customers to leave in a quiet manner.
- The front and the side of the premises to be cleared of litter on a daily basis.
- Appropriate proof of age (such as passport, driving licence or PASS scheme identification) shall be required where there is doubt as to the age of a customer.
- There shall be no adult entertainment or services, activities, other entertainment or matters ancillary to the use of the premises that may give rise to concern in respect of children.
- 4.7 A site plan is attached at **Annex C**.
- 4.8 In accordance with the requirements of the Act the applicant has served copies of the application upon the Licence Holder, Fire Authority, Environmental Health, Development Control, Police, and the Child Protection Agency.
- 4.9 Notices were placed by the Licensing Officer outside the premises and in the public area of the Licensing Office at 9-10 Bath Street, Bath, BA1 1SN, for a period of 28 days.
- 4.10 A representation in support of the Review has been received from the Police in respect of all four of the licensing objectives (Annex D). It recommends revocation of the premises licence.

- 4.11 A relevant representation has been received from an interested party living within the vicinity of the premises in respect of all four licensing objectives (**Annex E**).
- 4.12 This report has not been sent to the Trades Union because they would have no involvement in this application.

Sales of alcohol to children under the age of 18 undermining the licensing objectives of the Protection of Children From Harm and the Prevention of Crime and Disorder.

1. This department is designated a 'responsible authority' for the purposes of the Act and its main concern is 'the protection of children from harm'.

Trading Standards are part of the Public Protection Service which also deals with Alcohol Harm Reduction in conjunction with the Primary Care Trust (PCT). Extensive work has been carried out to raise awareness amongst young people of the harmful effects of alcohol consumption. Please see the attached information about this work provided by the Alcohol Harm Reduction officer.

Trading Standards are actively involved in the Licensing Enforcement Group, a multiagency partnership including the Police, B&NES Licensing, Child Protection, Environmental Health and Avon Fire and Rescue which was established to ensure compliance in licensed premises and assist in promoting the licensing objectives. As part of this Group we share intelligence and work with our partner agencies to resolve concerns. One of our functions is to carry out test purchase operations to ensure that alcohol is not being sold to children under the age of 18.

Concerns were raised about this premises following reports of anti-social behaviour and allegations that under age sales were taking place. In response a test purchase operation was arranged.

2. On 10th February 2010 the manager, Mr Shahzed Hussain, sold a bottle of Magners cider to a boy aged sixteen. This resulted in a fixed penalty notice (\pounds 80) being given by the Police to the manager. Please see attached statement.

3. On 17th March 2010 the Licence Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor, Mr Zaheer Hussain, attended a meeting at Bath Police Station to discuss concerns and establish improvements required for the management of the premises.

4. On 25th April 2010 this department received a complaint from a consumer about the store. The complainant stated that he had been in the shop on more than one occasion and that he had seen alcohol sold to teenagers that look under age. Please see attached the complaint.

5. On 17th May 2010 the Manager of the store sold a 500ml bottle of organic cider to a boy aged sixteen. Around ten minutes later he again sold a two litre bottle of cider to a different boy aged sixteen in front of a staff witness. Please see attached statements.

6. In all three cases, had the manager asked for identification, the volunteers would have stated that they did not have it.

7. This department has given advice and offers of support to the manager of the store to assist him in avoiding making sales to under age young people.

Despite this, and despite being given an opportunity to make improvements following the first failed test purchase in February 2010 the premises continues to undermine the licensing objectives of the protection of children from harm and the prevention of crime and disorder.

8. This department therefore respectfully submits that the licensing sub committee consider the serious nature of the evidence before them and exercise their power under section 52 of the Licensing Act 2003 to revoke the premises licence.

In support of the request to revoke the premises licence this department confirms that it has taken into account the Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003, the Home Office Guidance on the Yellow and Red Card approach and LACORS Guidance for Trading Standards Services and Licensing Authorities on Reviews.

The Yellow and Red Card approach recommends that at the first enforcement intervention a strong warning (the 'yellow card') is given to the problem premises. "The aim would be to put the premises on probation..... They are put on notice that the next offence or breach would mean an automatic second intervention – a red card.....If satisfied on the issue of the lack of improvement the licensing authority should look to revoke the licence. The action should be publicised in the area as an example to other retailers."

It is the view of this department, supported by the Police, that the first intervention has already occurred and that the premises licence holder has received a clear warning about the improvements required and the sanctions that may follow if problems persist. There has been no visible improvement in the conduct of the premises or any indiciation that the licence holder is willing to operate in a responsible manner in compliance with the law.

Paragraph 11.26 of the s.182 Guidance states that:

"There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises, which the Secretary of State considers should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises: .. for the purchase and consumption of alcohol by minors which impacts on the health, educational attainment, employment prospects and propensity for crime of young people."

Paragraph 11.24 of the s.182 Guidance states:

"The licensing authority's duty is to take steps with a view to the promotion of the licensing objectives in the interests of the wider community and not those of the individual licence holder."

The LACORS Guidance to Trading Standards Services issued in March 2009 provides the following advice on revocations:

"This is a measure to seek when there is no hope that the premsies can comply with its responsibilities under the Licensing Act, i.e. that the licensing objectives will continue to be undermined, regardless of whether conditions are attached, and where suspension would not result in any real or lasting change."

This department is aware of the serious business implications upon the licence holder should a decision to revoke the premises licence be made. The request to revoke the premises licence is not intended simply as a punitive measure but as the only clear way of ensuring the promotion of the licensing objectives in the interests of the wider community.

I am a Senior Trading Standards Officer employed by Bath and North East Somerset Council. On the 10th February 2010 I was introduced to two sixteen year old boys who had agreed to act as volunteers to attempt to purchase alcohol under my supervision. Prior to the test purchasing I explained to the two boys my service's policy when an underage person was taken to purchase age restricted goods. I asked the boys to select a bottle of alcohol from the shop we would be in and take it to the till and attempt to purchase it. I told the boys that any question asked of them by a member of staff must be answered truthfully and that they were not to attempt to persuade the member of staff to sell the alcohol to them. I also explained that if they were asked to produce identification to prove that they were aged over eighteen then they should say that they did not have identification with them and then wait and see what the member of staff's response would be. I told the boys that I was not concerned if the alcohol was sold to them or not and that they should not consider either outcome as a failure or success. At approximately 16.50 hrs the two volunteers and I arrived outside of Bright Stores at 16 Windsor Villas in Bath. I handed one of the volunteers a ten pound note and said that I would enter the shop and position myself in an area where I could observe them. I asked the two volunteers to enter Bright Stores shortly after I had and attempt to buy alcohol. At approximately 17.00 hrs I entered Bright Stores and positioned myself where I

could observe any purchase being made. Shortly afterwards I observed the two volunteers enter the shop and select a bottle of Magners cider and take it to the till. I was close enough to the till area so that I could hear everything the man behind the till and the two volunteers said to each other. The man behind the till who I now know as Mr Shahzed Hussain did not ask either of the volunteers their age or request identification from either volunteer to establish that they were aged eighteen or above. Mr Hussain took the ten pound note from the volunteers and gave them their change. The volunteers then left the shop. I introduced myself to Mr Hussain and explained that I had witnessed the sale of alcohol by him to Trading Standards volunteers who were aged sixteen years. I informed Mr Hussain that the sale of alcohol to people aged under eighteen was a criminal offence and that I would contact Bath Police to make arrangements for him to be issued with a

penalty notice.

I am a Senior Trading Standards Officer employed by Bath & North East Somerset Council. The Trading Standards service had received a recent complaint about a shop named Bright Stores at 16 Windsor Villas in Bath. This store had failed a test purchase carried out by Trading Standards officers using 16 year old volunteers on 10th February 2010. At this time a Mr Shahzed Hussain, from the store, had been given advice and a warning about selling alcohol to under age children. Following a discussion with the police, who had also received complaints about the same store, it was decided that it should be visited again to carry out a test purchase using volunteers aged under 18. On 17th May 2010 I carried out, with colleagues, a test purchasing operation on five premises, both on and off licences, including Bright Stores. Prior to the test purchases I explained to the two volunteers the service's policy when an under age person was taken to purchase age restricted goods. I stated that the volunteer should select a bottle of alcohol from the shop and take it to the till in order to purchase it. They were told not to attempt to persuade any member of staff to sell the bottle of alcohol to them. I also explained that if they were asked to produce identification that they should say that they did not have any and to see what the response would be from the member of staff. I stated that I was not concerned if the alcohol was sold to them or not, and that they should not consider either outcome as a failure or success. At around 4:45pm on 17th May one of the 16 year old boys who I was supervising entered the store. When he came out a short while later he was carrying a 500ml bottle of organic cider in a store bag. He reported that when he took the alcohol to the counter the person serving asked his age. The child stated that he was 18 but he was not asked for identification. The sale was made and the young person left the store. I decided then to test whether a sale would be made with an adult present in the store. I asked a colleague, Emma Stoneman, to enter the store and to stand sufficiently close to any sale that she could hear what was being said. As she entered the store I asked a different volunteer who was also 16 to enter the store to attempt to purchase alcohol. He did this and shortly after he returned with a 2L bottle of dry blackthorn cider. He reported that neither he nor the person serving said anything and that the person serving did

not ask his age or for identification. When Emma Stoneman left the store I spoke briefly to her about what she had heard and seen. I then entered the store with a colleague, Kirsty Langford, and addressed the person behind the counter. I showed my identification and asked his name. He said it was Mr Shahzed Hussain. I asked what his capacity was at the store and he stated he was the manager and that his brother, Mr Zaheer Hussain was the owner and licence holder. I explained that the person who had just left with the cider was only 16. Mr Hussain said that he had made a mistake and that he usually asks for identification. I then stated that the child who came in ten minutes earlier was also a volunteer and that he was not asked for identification. Mr Hussain then went on to say that he asks for identification regularly on the weekends but during week days he is not so vigilant. He said that he gets many young people in the store asking to buy alcohol. I explained that selling alcohol to people under the age of 18 was a serious matter and that once a shop had a reputation for selling to children, this would attract more children to the shop. In my opinion the children used as volunteers look their age, they are average height for their age and certainly do not look 18. Four other premises were tested the same evening with the same volunteers and none of these sold alcohol to them.

I am a Licensing Officer employed by Bath & North East Somerset Council. On Monday 17 May 2010, in the company of Senior Trading Standards Officer Robin Wood, Technical Assistant Kirsty Langford and two 16 year old male volunteers, I took part in a test purchasing operation led by the Trading Standards service. The operation targeted five premises, both on and off licences, including Bright Stores.					
At approximately 16.45 hours one of the volunteers entered Bright Stores. He had been given a £10 note and briefed by Robin Wood on how to carry out the test purchase. The volunteer emerged from the premises a few minutes later with a 500ml bottle of organic cider in a carrier bag. Robin Wood spoke to the volunteer about what had taken place inside the premises.					
Robin Wood then asked me to enter the premises so that I could observe the second volunteer attempt to purchase alcohol. I was asked to stand close enough to see and hear any exchange between the volunteer and the shop assistant. At approximately 17.05 hours I entered the premises and observed that there was one male shop assistant sitting behind the counter. There were no other people inside the premises. I went to the magazine shelf where I selected a copy of Heat magazine. Whilst I was there the second volunteer entered the premises and went to look at the alcohol display. He selected a large bottle and went to the counter. I then moved to the confectionary aisle where I had a clear and unobstructed view of the shop counter and was close enough to hear any conversation that might take place.					
The volunteer placed the large bottle on the counter and handed a £10 note to the shop assistant. The shop assistant did not speak to the volunteer but simply held his hand out to collect the money. He returned the change to the volunteer and handed him a carrier bag saying "here you go". The volunteer said "thanks" and took the bag and large bottle and left the premises.					
I selected a bar of chocolate and purchased this along with the magazine before also leaving the premises. Once outside the premises I outlined my observations to Robin Wood and Kirsty Langford who then went into the premises to speak with the shop assistant.					
We carried out a further four test purchases in two off licences and two on licences using the same volunteers. No further sales were made.

- 20/05/2010 Reported for summons by PC Andrew GRABOWSKI for Selling alcohol to person under the age of 18years.
- 01/06/2010 Sold to 14 year old who was taken to the Royal United Hospital, for excessive alcohol consumption. S9 statement From mother attached.
- 03/06/2010 Liquor Licensing officer Martin PURCHASE attended the store and spoke with shahzad HUSSAIN informing him of the very Serious nature of sales to persons underage and the total Disregard for the law (copy letter attached)

Bright Stores, Windsor Villas, Bath: Minutes of Meeting held at Bath Police Station on Wednesday 17th March 2010, between Sergeant Nick Quine, Zaheer Hussain, and Phil Lawrence (Police licensing)

Meeting held as a result of numerous complaints of anti-social behaviour in immediate vicinity of shop, alleged sales of alcohol to persons under the age of age, failed test purchases, and associated littering.

NQ stated that he was not satisfied with the way the business was conducted, and that he wished to resolve Police concerns as soon as possible without damaging his business.

NQ raised the conditions on the premises licence:

CCTV: the shop manager is unable to operate the system which is unsatisfactory when the Police need immediate access to images, reminding ZH that CCTV is for the protection of staff as well as providing evidence to the Police. ZH said that all images are stored on the hard drive and are accessible, but that his manager (and brother) 'Shaz' needs additional training.

Notices to leave quietly: notice not displayed, which is a breach of licence condition.

Litter collection: bins are provided, and the shop is tidy, but more effort needs to be made in the immediate vicinity. The shop is a focal point for youths and more responsibility need to be taken for the behaviour of customers and the litter they leave behind. This means the immediate vicinity and the road alongside at the end of trading each day. At present local residents clear up some of the rubbish, this should not be necessary.

Under age sales: More care required as to who alcohol is sold to, and a proof of age scheme used. 'Shaz' does not always do this, and the shop has reputation in the area for selling alcohol to children. NQ suggested that 'Shaz' should obtain a licensing qualification and a personal licence to give him more personal responsibility. ZH said that this should not be necessary as he has vast experience in the trade.

ZH admitted that he only visits the shop about once a week: PL said that the DPS should be in day to day control, which ZH clearly is not. ZH disputed some of the allegations made, and said that the Police should listen to all sides, because some neighbours may not like him, but he agreed to exercise better management and control of the shop as DPS and premises licence holder.

NQ reminded ZH that he had a licence to sell alcohol, and should treat this responsibility seriously, and that we would like to see a vast improvement as an alternative to a Police application to review the premises licence.

Agreed measures:

CCTV to be checked and 'Shaz' taught how to retrieve images.

Proof of age scheme to be adopted.

Notice to leave quietly to be displayed.

ZH said that he felt that the complaints had been 'blown up out of proportion', but admitted that improvements could be made, and assured NQ that there would be no further problems. NQ reminded him that further test purchases will follow. It was agreed that the situation would be reviewed on 15th May 2010.

This matter is very serious, and could have resulted in the death of a child through your total disregard in respect of underage sales of alcohol.

SUBMISSION OF EVIDENCE

REFERENCE - 10/02255/LAPRE BRIGHT STORES, 16A WINDSOR VILLAS, LOWER WESTON, BATH BA1 3DJ

The following constitutes my evidence towards a review of the alcohol licence at Bright Stores.

Virtually as soon as the sale of alcohol was permitted from the premises, there was a marked rise in gatherings of adolescents and younger children in Kelson's Field to the rear of my property. I have an unfettered view of the field and much of the adjacent play area from my kitchen and rear bedroom windows.

It was clear from what I saw, that alcohol was being consumed, often in a reckless manner, by many youngsters, most of whom appeared to be under the age of eighteen. Indeed some of them were clearly very young (pre-pubescent). I have observed on countless occasions, one or two of a large party of children leave the field in the direction of the shop only to return four or five minutes later with carrier bags. From these bags they would distribute bottles, identifiable even from a distance as cider, vodka and the like, to others in the group. Money would change hands between 'dealers' and recipients either before leaving for the shop or on return. I cannot confirm that the alcohol was purchased from Bright Stores; but the time lapsing between the children leaving my view and returning with purchases, suggests to me that there could be no other conclusion to reasonably draw than they had been sold alcoholic drinks at Bright Stores. The bottles would be carried in carrier bags which I believe to have been those used by Bright Stores.

On one occasion in May this year, I was walking through the field with my dog, to overhear one boy, who appeared to be about fourteen, shout to one of the girls in his group, "How much did your litre cost you, was it ± 11.00 ?". She replied, "I didn't have enough money so he let me have it for half-price". He returned five minutes later with a bottle. One can draw one's own conclusions from this particular episode.

There has consequently been a marked deterioration in noise from Kelson's Field which has been unpleasant, loud and often offensive – swearing, screaming etc. This has been particularly so at weekends and during school holidays. Furthermore, antisocial behaviour has markedly increased, including young people urinating in full public view (this includes young girls who appear to have similarly relaxed inhibitions to the boys in this regard). The behaviour of these drunken children is not only offensive but is intimidating to witness. Whilst these are only children and I am sure they are most of the time like any other child of this age group; when inebriated I do not view them as approachable or open to reason. I know my neighbours' children find them intimidating and are unable to play in the field themselves because of this habitual problem.

Litter pollution has increased dramatically over this period. It is now commonplace for my neighbours and I to have to clear the field of detritus in the mornings. Litter commonly found includes empty carrier bags blown across the field, empty beer cans, vodka and beer bottles/tops and plastic cider bottles. Broken glass is now much more common than hitherto, which is particularly concerning given that the field and adjacent play area are frequented by dog-walkers and parents with small children.

I have lived at this property for nearly 20 years. Never in that period have I known such a rapid and noticeable degeneration in noise, pollution and anti-social and nodoubt for the youngsters concerned, unhealthy behaviour. This has only occurred, in my view, because of the ability of Bright Stores to sell alcohol to undesirable and underage individuals.

4 THE REPORT

- 4.1 An application has been received for a **new** Premises Licence (Annex A).
- 4.2 The application is for:
 - 1) The **Sale of Alcohol**, with food orders only, for consumption off the premises, between the following hours:

Monday to Sunday 11.00 to 23.00

2) The proposed **Opening Hours** are as follows:

Monday to Sunday 11:00 to 23.00

4.3 A site plan is attached at Annex B.

- 4.4 The Licensing Act 2003 (Section 4) states that it is the duty of all Licensing Authorities to carry out their functions under the Act with a view to promoting the licensing objectives. The licensing objectives are:
 - a) The Prevention of Crime and Disorder.
 - b) Public Safety.
 - c) The Prevention of Public Nuisance, and
 - d) The Protection of Children from Harm.

Each objective is of equal importance; there are no other licensing objectives so these four are of paramount consideration at all times. When considering applications/representations/notifications the Licensing Authority will have regard to these licensing objectives.

- 4.5 The Licensing Authority may grant the application with or without additional conditions.
- 4.6 The Licensing Authority should also have regard to the Council's Licensing Policy, the Statutory Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003, and the Licensing Act itself, and in particular to:
 - a) Paragraphs 3, 5, 6, 9, 10, 15-20, 23, 24, 28, 33-37, 41 to 44 of the policy.
 - b) Chapters 8, 9 and 10 of the Statutory Guidance (as revised on 28 June 2008).
 - c) Sections 4, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 16, 17, 18, 23, 182, 183, and Schedule 2 of the Act.
- 4.7 If the application is refused the applicant may appeal within 21 days of the notification to the Magistrates Court. If the application is granted the person making the relevant representation may appeal within 21 days of the notification to the Magistrates Court.

On appeal the court may either dismiss the appeal; substitute the decision appealed against for any other decision which could have been made by the Licensing Authority, or remit the case to the Licensing Authority to dispose of it in accordance with the direction of the court. The court may make such order for costs as it thinks fit.

- 4.8 In accordance with the requirements of the Act the applicants served copies of the application upon the police, the fire authority, environmental health, development control, trading standards, and the child protection agency.
- 4.9 The applicant is required to place a notice at the premises for a period of 28 days starting the day after the application is made and place an advert in a local newspaper within 10 days of submitting the application to the licensing authority.
- 4.10 Representations have been received from a local resident and the Circus Area Residents' Association in relation to the licensing objectives of the Prevention of Crime and Disorder, the Prevention of Public Nuisance and the Protection of Children From Harm (Annex C).
- 4.11 This report has not been sent to the Trades Union because they would have no involvement.

a) General – all four licensing objectives (b,c,d,e) (please read guidance note 9)

The premises have been trading in takeaway food in excess of 6 months during the hours subject of this application and have not experienced any problems. The proposal to supply alcohol with a food order will promote the quality of the takeaway product and meet a growing demand for delivery of wine with food. The combined sale of food with alcohol historically has been considered quite minor risks to both crime and disorder, but conditions are needed to prevent sales of alcohol to children.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

- 1. Only sample alcohols will be on display at the serving area.
- 2. All alcohol stock to be kept on the 1st floor.
- 3. CCTV system in agreement with Police.

I/We have already made a written representation and have no further comments

I live at 26 Rivers Street and my house is almost the closest of the many houses in the proximity of 10 Rivers Street Place.

I am writing to object to the application for a Premises Licence at 10 Rivers Street Place on the following grounds:

the prevention of crime and disorder:

Rivers Street Place is at the centre of a densely populated residential area of mixed socioeconomic character; the fact that there are shops (and now a take-away) open late at night means that the pavements around Lampards Buildings and Rivers Street Place become something of a gathering place, particularly late at night, and when the weather is warm. This can create noise and disturbance and can be intimidating for those passing through the area and living all around. Alcohol is already available in three premises in Rivers Street Place and Burlington Place and whilst the consumption of alcohol on the streets may be banned it still takes place. Fights and noisy altercations fuelled by alcohol on the pavements around Rivers Street Place are a regular occurrence. My own car parked in Rivers Street was recently vandalised by a party of drunken men walking down the street. The greater availability of alcohol will only increase this kind of behaviour.

• public safety:

For the reasons already stated public safety will be endangered by the greater availability of alcohol in the area. Julian Road is a busy through road and the greater incidence of alcohol consumption around Rivers Street Place will cause more accidents, more vandalism, more intimidation and make people feel unsafe: streets become safer and less intimidating when the majority are not frightened away by the antisocial and intimidating behaviour of a few.

· prevention of public nuisance:

The prevention of public nuisance can only be made more difficult by granting this licence. Urinating, vomiting and intimidation of passers by is already a regular occurrence in an around Rivers Street Place and the granting of a licence is likely to make this behaviour more prevalent.

• the protection of children from harm

Rivers Street Place is close to a primary school (which was attended by my own daughter) and close to the homes of many young children. The shops adjacent to 10 Rivers Street

place are frequented by small children particularly at the end of the school day, but also later at night, and any action which might needlessly increase the risk to a single one of these children should be avoided.

B&NES own Statement of Licensing Policy 2008 states that 'Bath City Centre experiences a significantly greater degree of alcohol related crime and disorder than the remainder of the authority area and that Bath City Centre can be defined as experiencing a significant amount of alcohol related crime'. 10 Rivers Street falls within the Cumulative Impact Zone and with three other licences premises within metres of 10 Rivers Street Place it is obvious that the granting of another licence can only increase the cumulative impact of the licensed premises on the vicinity.

Chief Superindent Davies of Bath Police was reported as recently as 3 June 2010 as calling for urgent action over the problems caused by people "drinking themselves into oblivion" in the city. He is reported as saying he was "fed up" with people urinating in doorways and vomiting in the street and to have said "we can't continue to tolerate this level of anti-social behaviour". I believe his views reflect the views of the majority of people living in this part of Bath, and the city in general and I urge you to refuse this application.

LICENCE APPLICATION - SOLO BURGER BAR, 10 RIVERS PLACE, JULIAN ROAD, BATH

The Circus Area Residents Association represents over 100 households in the area between George Street and Julian Road in Bath. Around a dozen of these are near the premises subject to this application.

We object to the application for a licence on the grounds that it will conflict with the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder, and prevention of public nuisance.

Julian Road passes through a densely populated area, and we believe that a licensed take-away is likely to become a focus of activity. To our observation the current premises are not very busy, and we are concerned that the underlying purpose of the application is to change the nature of the business and to drive sales through the inducement of cut-price liquor sales. This is likely to lead to problems.

Crime and disorder. There is a history of late night disorderly conduct. On more than one occasion, commercial refuse left outside McColls has been set alight, and the last occurrence nearly resulted in a serious fire. The Fire Brigade have warned businesses in Julian Road not to leave anything outside at night for fear of a repeat.

Although the applicant says they have experienced no problems, we understand the Police have been called to these premises on at least one occasion.

Anything which encourages people to hang around with alcohol in the late evening is undesirable.

Public nuisance. This area is somewhat intimidating for elderly residents in the late evening, with people hanging around for various purposes. It is already possible to buy liquor in McColls, the Coop and the Julian Road Stores, but these are well-ordered shops and they do not provide take-away food. We are concerned that the combination of take-away food and alcohol will lead to antisocial behaviour, with people consuming the food and drink in the street, and leaving litter, bottles and cans in the vicinity.

Cumulative impact. These premises fall within the Cumulative Impact Zone in Bath, and are close to three other shops in Julian Road which already sell liquor by offlicence. Another outlet can only add to the problems in the area.

For these reasons, we ask the Licensing Panel to refuse the application. If they are nevertheless minded to grant it, we would urge them to impose conditions to forestall potential problems:

- a condition to prohibit special offers/cut price sales /free drink offers.
- In view of the applicant's contention that there is increasing demand for delivery of wine with food, a condition that the only alcohol sold should be wine delivered to the customer's address through the delivery service.
