1.1	DD welcomed those present.	
2.	Introductions and Apologies	
2.2	All introduced themselves. Apologies as above.	
3.	Presentation on the new Forum and Workshop	
3.1	AP gave a presentation, highlighting the achievements of the Somer Valley Partnership and explaining the role of the new Forum. The aim is to build on what went before but be more ambitious. Also, for local Town/Parish Councils and communities to play more of a role and have more influence. Hard copies of the presentation were circulated at the meeting and an electronic version will be sent with the minutes.	AW
3.2	AP asked if there were any questions/comments:-	
	CC asked whether B&NES are really going to start liaising with people outside Bath? AP said the plan is to work in a different way across the	

	whole of B&NES.	
3.3	BMc said, taking budget setting as an example, what Parishes want and what the Somer Valley Forum want may differ and does B&NES care? Parishes will focus on precepts in their own area, not elsewhere. AP said the Council does want feedback on its budgets. The question of precepts is a matter for individual Parish Councils but they may wish to liaise with each other.	
3.4	LM said the theory is great but she does have concerns around whether B&NES will continue to act first and tell us after. She suggested that a Compact is drawn up.	
3.5	RM said he is keen that Parishes in Mendip participate in a more formal way. Community Infrastructure Levy and Section 106 will be based on geographic areas but have impact on surrounding areas.	
3.6	AP introduced the 2 workshop questions and suggested that while groups discuss these, the voting slips are circulated.	
4.	Election of the Chair and Vice Chair	
4.1	DD said that three members have been nominated as Chair:-	
	Terry Taylor - NRR Lynda Robertson – Midsomer Norton Society Cllr Lesley Mansell – Radstock Town Council	
	Lynda Robertson and Lesley Mansell had also been nominated to stand as Vice Chair.	
	All confirmed that they were prepared to stand.	
4.2	PM said that a vote for both posts could not take place simultaneously and should be separate.	
4.3	SG said that the candidates are unknown to some in the room and asked them to give short presentations to introduce themselves, their background and what they will contribute. This was done.	
4.4	The voting slips were distributed and collected while the workshop sessions took place. The results were:-	
	Terry Taylor – 9 votes Lynda Robertson – 7 votes Cllr Lesley Mansell – 7 votes Abstentions - 3	
4.5	RM proposed that LR and LM jointly take the position of Vice Chair. Some members agreed while others felt that a second vote for the position of Vice Chair should be held. (NH left the meeting).	
4.6	AP asked for a show of hands, with 15 agreeing to two Vice Chairs and 8	

	requesting a second election. AP said it will be for the Chair and the two Vice Chairs to agree how they might make this work.	
4.7	DC said that now a Chair had been elected, they should take over the meeting.	
4.8	Feedback was given from the workshop groups and will be circulated with minutes.	AW
4.9	BMc said the feedback was very encouraging. The subject of jobs was raised frequently. He noted that the Somer Valley Partnership members had the opportunity to determine the Agenda and he would like to see this again. AP said that is the idea.	
4.10	TT thanked everyone for electing him as Chair and said he looked forward to presenting a united front to B&NES where we share our ideas with them, rather than make demands. AP said it is also important to remember that the Forum is about working with other Public Services as well as the Council.	
4.11	The meeting was closed at 9pm and it was agreed to defer the adoption of the Terms of Reference and other items until the next meeting.

#### 2. Introduction to the Facilitated Workshop – Rowena Harris

**Purpose** – the Forums have been designed to provide a stronger voice for the community and help improve engagement with the public sector partners. The workshop aimed to help the Forums consider different ways of working together on specific ideas, gain a better understanding of what partners can offer and review the influence and effectiveness of the Forums for the future.

- **a. What's already happening?** The Forums could provide ways of exchanging information: people were asked to bring posters or a pre-written postcard/notes to tell other people in the area about things planned or underway to improve things in their community.
- b. What issues concern you NOW and what ideas do you have to make a change? People were encouraged to write on post it notes under the following headings:
  - 1. Health & Wellbeing
  - 2. Transport
  - 3. New housing and infrastructure developments
  - 4. Environmental Sustainability & Climate Change
  - 5. Skills and Jobs
  - 6. Stronger and Safer Communities
  - 7. Education
  - 8. Young people
  - 9. Older People

- o Engaging young people: lead Heidi Limbert B & NES Children's Centres
- Economic development for Radstock: lead Oliver Jones
- Improving communication between &B & NES and Town and Parish Councils: lead Kirstie Green Timsbury Parish Clerk
- Support for local workless families: (no notes handed in)
- Services in villages (no discussion took place)

## What's already happening in the Somer Valley area?



## What issues concern you most at the moment and what ideas do you have to make a change?

#### Post - it notes as follows

#### Health & Wellbeing

- the old style SVF was a very good model the 'core' strategy was discussed by the locals and adopted with very high levels of support
- unhealthy weight require greater funding to run more courses in the area on healthy eating as 20 30% 5 year olds are obese
- develop a B & NES school leaving fitness test & certificate with grades increase self esteem of non-academic pupils, tackle obesity, set up lifelong
  healthy habits
- sharing of information between organisations to support service delivery and evidencing impact
- more local inclusive disability sport roadshows in Timsbury, encourage local sports providers - wheelchair users in the village want to be more active, accessing cricket, tennis etc
- access to leisure facilities in Peasedown St John
- more NHS dentists to promote dental health outreach support to groups within Children's Centres





#### Transport

- Timsbury Road Safety Group: non-political, non-funded group of residents, open to anyone concerned about road safety in Timsbury. They are working with B & NES to consider how to implement a 20 mph speed limit. Look on Timsbury web site.
- The Roads & Transport sub group of the Placemaking Group, together with Timsbury Road safety group, the PC, B & NES engineers, transport manager, police and residents have attended a series of workshops to develop a strategy for improving traffic flows in North Road Timsbury, to improve pedestrian safety, not harm existing businesses & reduce speeding. About to be implemented WATCH THIS SPACE!
- Timsbury road safety ease traffic flow, safety issues to be addressed where road widening not possible
- some ability to improve parking in central Timsbury, currently reaching grid lock
- shoppers car park Timsbury High Street is too small. Cars are left there too long so it's often impossible to find a space, very difficult for elderly or disabled
- parking is very bad in Timsbury and will only get worse
- not enough disabled parking in village or Bath
- disabled parking needs to be more inclusive for larger vehicles with tail gates.
   A minibus with a 3mtr access requirement cannot use many of the disabled spaces
- work with the villages to consider the area wide impact of vehicle weight/size controls
- lack of road links around Bath are killing our businesses
- stop out sourcing services- it is cheaper to do in house. Just building more houses is not regeneration and does not help transport problems (e.g. more commuter traffic from Radstock to Bath, Bristol, Frome. Why not reinstate rail links AT THE SAME TIME AS building more houses. N.B. no new roads are planned
- NETWORK required to allow links between journeys e.g. bus, cycle routes
- produce a new traffic & transport model for the whole area
- Timsbury needs accessible public transport for wheel chair users to maintain independence
- affordable public transport to community facilities
- costs of transport means that it costs more to go from PSJ to MSN than to go to Bath - negative impact on local economy
- cost of transport is high within rural areas reduced access to services action: subsidies for families
- loss of 184 bus service
- no buses into Bath after 7.30 p.m.
- transport from Radford to Timsbury 1 mile walk uphill to nearest bus stop
- franchising of bus services to control buses across council boundaries as many people work and play in Bristol
- efficiency potholes don't patch, do a proper job
- potholes in roads unsafe danger to residents at Greenhill House who have to go into the road to access village shops - pavements are not wide enough for their wheelchairs, the camber tips them into the road
- Leonard Cheshire Disabled we do not get our roads gritted which means we feel isolated - need a grit for a distance of 200 m and 3 minutes of time to deliver

- please make sure vulnerable people e.g. Cheshire Homes, have access to facilities /emergency vehicles in icy weather - road should be gritted
- gritting of Radford Hill towards Clandown
- dropped kerbs need to be flush to the road so that electric wheelchair users can safely access pavements and cross roads

#### New housing and infrastructure developments

- Timsbury improved broadband urgently needed to encourage new and existing businesses
- when is Cam valley going to get good broadband and mobile phone signals?
- provide genuine traffic impact assessment of the effects of new development i.e. 5,10,20 miles away not 100 yards up the road
- ensure that new developments are only implemented in accordance with the Core Strategy and are led by this plan
- no mains sewers at Radford each house has its own septic tank
- one size fits all the 'city' mentality does not fit allow differences
- poor quality and expensive private rented housing threat to RSL's from Government housing proposals
- affordable housing still not affordable for residents
- we need new housing that is affordable for our children, built in a sensitive and sustainable way with attention paid to added parking within any development
- new houses should have parking space for at least one car
- give Parish Councils the chance to decide who gets local housing
- give local people the chance to settle in their village of birth and don't let outsiders take new houses
- support families moving into new housing i.e. induction how to reduce mould, save on heating
- new affordable housing necessary where building land is available but important to keep communities together - not all running into each other



#### • Environmental Sustainability & Climate Change

- unless the planning process prioritises good environment in its decisions it will continue to reduce - a 'false' green space substitute is not the answer
- local communities should identify locations for appropriate scale sustainable energy generation - solar panels, wind farms - and to have a final say on them

#### Skills and Jobs

- what are the problems that 'we' can work together to overcome: jobs, buses, bad planning, anti-social, preservation of green belt
- availability of affordable workspaces
- improve the support available to help people back into work, very few services available in Somer Valley all centralised in Bath
- promote use of living wage for over 18's 18 year olds earning £5.13 an hour
- living wage for 18 year olds so they can afford to live
- encourage more employment opportunities by having a clear plan for generating inward investment
- severe cuts in community budgets can prevent useful community tasks being done. The money earned is spent 'in the system' very quickly and circulates, much of it back to the government
- support business organisations like the Chamber of Commerce to help businesses to help themselves
- will B & NES apply for economic partnership funding for Somer Valley to establish more jobs?
- lack of jobs for young people

#### • Stronger and Safer Communities

- creative social hub for health, housing and the arts in Radstock
- hub type facility somewhere for charities like Age Concern UK to hold surgeries, an internet cafe facility at a reasonable price for young mums & older generation to meet. An extra room at Conygre Hall could be used consider extension or ensure YMCA can use it at reasonable rates
- increase role of arts and culture in empowering communities to develop socially - increasing social capital leading to education and employment opportunities
- information sharing when appropriate of incidents of domestic violence so that the support can be introduced at the right time
- reduce anti-social behaviour by having more street pastors
- need to improve road safety in our village i.e. traffic calming, reduction in speed, measures to ensure children have safer journeys to and from school
- improve the walk or cycle to school e.g. Paulton to MSN
- Timsbury PC is about to begin working with the Community Pay Back Scheme to improve the visual impact and safety of the village
- cambers on pavements very difficult for wheelchair users
- stop policy on pavements because a wheelchair user is not visible when they need to cross the road
- we are very concerned about the safety of disabled people using local footpaths and roads - lots of pot holes, damaged uneven areas - causing damage to our vehicles
- speed tables in Gullock Tyning replace ineffective bumps, close gate of Somer centre at night to reduce anti-social behaviour

#### Education

- give parents more information including performance tables in the secondary school admissions brochure better schools more informed choice
- skills education for less academic children to include forest schools, sewing classes, farming etc
- removal of funding to colleges and students

 ensure that educational provision in accordance with the planned development required by the Core Strategy to avoid children having to be educated outside their local communities - plan ahead!!!

#### Young people

- school aged children Brownies, Guides, Scouts etc but youth facilities required for those who do not take part in these activities
- older teenagers need to have places they can 'hang out' without being moved on by police
- give the money to the community to help all young people instead of just focussing on problem cases in a couple of centres with expensive staff
- increase investment for Children's Centres to act as a hub for supported troubled families
- ask young people what they want appropriate consultation to reflect the diversity of the community
- the school holidays are a problem for working families there could be more working together in local villages to provide a spread of activities for all ages during the holidays
- young people need to be encouraged to take up sporting activities but need supervision
- how will B & NES support children and young people in Somer Valley area?
- school leaving fitness test and certificate

#### • Older People

- Timsbury create a hub for the benefit of old and young library, internet, cafe, meeting rooms
- ageing well awareness programme involving all generations in ageing society
- gritting in bad weather to ease fears of frail and disabled people
- isolation becoming a problem, older people are afraid to go out at night, people living longer with more health problems
- better publicity for all clubs and venues to help isolation problems
- try to bring the various organisations together to help each other to achieve more meaningful and common objectives ensure everyone has a say
- improve links between isolated elderly and young families e.g. children in secondary schools encouraged to befriend an old person
- where will people go for books when the library is closed?
- join the University of the Third Age life-long learning
- the council should do more to get older people out of houses
- pilot home share initiative to help older people stay at home and provide affordable accommodation for those in need - have an integrated and shared vision for independent living services

#### Other

- you want us to do more & more like a team but you never let us think as a team
- we want to be able to talk to each other not talked at
- we should SHARE both good and bad issues and learn from one another, help each other WORK TOGETHER using best practice
- why can't we as members talk to each other it's our Forum
- local priorities should be the TOP of our agenda: dog mess (we know the owners) traffic (parking, speeding) business (lack of), development (inappropriate): we know best!
- unless unitary authority officers and departments start communicating across their boundaries there will continue to be waste and contradictory decisions

- what does the new closer working arrangements with other councils mean?
- different priorities in different areas...whether village/group or adjacent areas
- avoid overt politicisation of local issues. Parish councils are not responsible for EEC or immigration or the national wage!
- an innovative and risk taking approach for redesign of services be more outward looking using examples of best practice from UK and international
- Neighbourhood Plans and Placemaking the lack of decisions is holding back village projects
- joined up planning and consultation
- use other agencies as vehicles to consult with vulnerable families there is a willingness, let's find a way!
- what about meaningful consultation e.g. changes to leisure facilities
- more consultation needed regarding services e.g. change in leisure facilities in MSN and Bath
- lack of consultation regarding tendering and facilities
- poorer communities unable to fund raise to replace lost central and local government cash
- abandoned 'ranger' scheme parish allocates jobs e.g. clearing vegetation, verges etc B & NES supplies training/certification for 1 individual to use weed killer
- volunteering hampered by need for residents to work multiple jobs
- more funding for voluntary training e.g. first aid
- volunteers already deliver fishing for disabled people and need better facilities to increase this locally and expand to other sports activities
- standardise and publish B & NES property strategy for surplus property e.g. garages, much needed garage space was sold by B & NES, sale held in London, not advertised locally for rent or sale
- B & NES property division can we know what property is owned in a Parish and be warned if selling and given an option on purchase if special circumstances
- reliance on food banks and other charitable donations
- what is happening with the parish Charter that Peter Duppa Miller compiled?
- efficiency inspect all work before paying the bill!
- town park for Midsomer Norton Bath, Keynsham, Radstock all have parks
- more of a civic lead from Radstock Town Council bringing organisations together to bring in outside investment e.g. European Funding (ESIF Building Better Opportunities)
- Gritting: South Road residents in the Cheshire Home deserve better service!
- we need more dropped kerbs to enable disabled residents, old and young, to access local shops safely

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## Terms of Reference Somer Valley Forum

#### 1. Name and Area of Benefit

- 1.1 The name shall be the Somer Valley Forum
- 1.2 The Somer Valley Forum will cover the two Towns and six Parishes of:-

Farrington Gurney; High Littleton; Midsomer Norton; Paulton; Peasedown St John; Radstock; Timsbury and Westfield.

1.3 Corresponding Members will be:-

Camerton and Shoscombe (B&NES)

Chilcompton; Coleford; Hemington; Holcombe (request to be removed received April 2015); Kilmersdon; Stratton-on-the-Fosse (Mendip)

#### 2. Background

- 2.1 The Somer Valley Forum is part of an initiative that aims to improve the external engagement of the Council and its partners by bringing together neighbourhoods, villages and towns to reflect local issues and priorities.
- 2.2 Whilst creating operational boundaries, it is also important in identifying local priorities and bringing together local communities where there are shared and common issues.
- 2.3 Each area of the initiative will be supported by a local 'Forum' that will work together to improve local engagement, join up services and foster communication so local people receive better outcomes.
- 2.4 Each Forum may collaborate with other Forums to share good practice and engage in wider discussions. This collaborative approach is designed to secure involvement of stakeholders and local residents.

#### 3. Aims and Objectives

- 3.1 The overall aim is to provide a mechanism for collaboration between communities and public bodies; including Bath and North East Somerset Council and members of the Public Services Board; in order to improve local engagement, join up services and foster communication so local people receive better outcomes.
- 3.2 The objectives are to:-
  - Involve residents and organisations by seeking their views and encouraging them to participate in improving their quality of life
  - Identify common issues across this area and debate local priorities

- Discuss how organisations, including this Forum, will work most effectively together to respond to the local priorities and take action where appropriate
- Influence wider policy developments and encourage meaningful conversation

#### 4. Key principles

- 4.1 All voting and non-voting members of the Somer Valley Forum agree to follow the five key principles of the Connecting Communities programme which are:-
  - To **listen** always being open to ideas.
  - To **prioritise** making sure local needs come first.
  - To **join up** working in partnership with our local communities.
  - To work collaboratively helping communities find the best way to tackle local issues.
  - To share ideas building on what works.

#### 5. Membership

5.1 The Core Membership of the Somer Valley Forum will be:-

#### **Non-voting Members**

One officer representative from the following public services:-

- Avon and Somerset Constabulary
- Avon Fire and Rescue Service
- Curo
- NHS Bath and North East Somerset
- Bath & North East Somerset Council

#### **Voting Members**

- All B&NES elected ward members in the Somer Valley Forum area
- Up to 2 representatives from all of the Parish Councils in the Somer Valley Forum area
- Up to 2 representatives from the Town Councils in the Somer Valley Forum area
- Further voting members may be drawn from voluntary, community and social enterprise organisations and local business, within the area of benefit as defined in 1.2
- 5.3 Meetings of the Somer Valley Forum shall be open to the public. A notice of every meeting will be placed on Bath and North East Somerset Council's web meeting diary. All members of the Somer Valley Forum will be requested to promote all meetings to encourage wider engagement. Members of the public may speak/participate at the Chair's discretion.

- 5.4 An organisation may apply to become a member of the Somer Valley Forum and this shall be considered at the Forum AGM, subject to a maximum number of 50 members. Applicants will be associate members until this time, subject to 5.6 below.
- 5.5 Members that do not attend, or give apology for, three consecutive meetings of the Somer Valley Forum will be deemed to have allowed their membership to lapse but will be welcome to re-apply.
- 5.6 The Secretarial support role will be carried out by Bath & North East Somerset Council, Strategy and Performance Service.

#### 6. Role of the Chair and Vice Chair

- 6.1 The Chair and Vice Chair will be elected from the voting membership set out above. They shall act independently and work on behalf of the Forum for the wider benefit.
- 6.2 The Chair and Vice Chair will meet with the relevant officers of Bath and North East Somerset Council to propose agendas, discuss how issues might be resolved and report to the Forum as appropriate.

#### 7. Working Methods

- 7.1 The Somer Valley Forum will meet at least 4 times a year, one of which meetings shall be an Annual General Meeting.
- 7.2 A third of voting members should be in attendance at each Somer Valley Forum meeting, for the meeting to be quorate.
- 7.3 Agendas and papers for meetings will be circulated a minimum of seven calendar days before a meeting. A record of each meeting will be taken.
- 7.4 Every member of the Somer Valley Forum shall be accorded the same degree of respect, dignity and consideration by all other members, irrespective of people's protected characteristics: age, disability, gender reassignment, marriage and civil partnership, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex and sexual orientation and with regard to equalities legislation.

#### 8. Agenda Planning

- 8.1. The Somer Valley Forum will adopt a core agenda for ordinary meetings as follows:-
  - Welcome, Introductions and Apologies
  - Declarations of Interest
  - Minutes of the Last Meeting
  - Matters Arising
  - Standing Items (eg Community Safety, Transportation)
  - Parish and Town Council Items
  - Community Items
  - Consultation Items (eg Council, Police, CCG etc)

#### 9. Area profile

9.1 The Somer Valley Forum will establish and keep updated an Area Profile that aims to inform the priorities for the Forum.

#### 10. Annual General Meetings

- 10.1 The Somer Valley Forum will hold an Annual General Meeting each year or within fourteen months of the anniversary of the inaugural meeting.
- 10.2 The Somer Valley Forum will elect a Chair and Vice-Chair at its first inaugural meeting. These positions will be held for one year and thereafter elections will take place at the Annual General Meeting.
- 10.3 At the first inaugural meeting and subsequent AGM meetings, the Somer Valley Forum shall:
  - i. Elect the Chair and Vice Chair
  - ii. Review the Terms of Reference
  - iii. Agree how organisations, including this Forum, will work together to respond to the local priorities and take action where appropriate
  - iv. Influence wider policy developments
  - v. Review its progress annually and consider how to engage more widely, showcase initiatives and share good practice
- 10.4 Any voting member may stand to be elected as Chair or Vice Chair. The existing Chair and Vice Chair may seek re-election.
- 10.5 Nominations for Chair and Vice Chair may be received prior to and at the AGM. This includes self-nominations for both positions.

#### 11. Voting

- 11.1 The Somer Valley Forum will seek to work through the development of consensus.
- 11.2 Decisions, including alterations to the Terms of Reference, will be made by a simple majority vote, subject to the quorum of the meeting (see 7.2 above).

#### 12. Working Parties

- 12.1 The Somer Valley Forum may establish from time to time working parties that will be responsible for undertaking specific topics as necessary.
- 12.2 Members of the working parties may co-opt individuals or organisations to join, in an advisory capacity, to support their objectives.
- 12.3 A record of working party meetings will be taken and reported back at the Somer Valley Forum meetings.

#### 13. Dissolution

- 13.1 A proposal for dissolution of the Somer Valley Forum will require the approval of the majority of voting members.
- 13.2 All funds, documents and possessions shall be disposed of in accordance with the wishes of the majority of voting members.

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# Connecting Communities Draft Action plan 2015


## 1. About Connecting Communities

Local residents are able to use different methods to inform the Council and public sector partners about the delivery of services. However, what has been lacking is a joined-up approach to planning services for future needs and no consistency when engaging with local communities.

The 'Connecting Communities' programme is an initiative designed to help public service providers understand the needs of the diverse range of people and communities that make up Bath and North East Somerset. The approach has been built around five key principles:

- Listen
- Prioritise
- Join-up
- Work with you and;
- Share ideas

The programme has divided Bath and North East Somerset into five distinct geographical areas: Bath, Bathavon, Chew Valley, Keynsham and Somer Valley.



Each area is supported and represented by a local 'Forum' with the aim of improving engagement between public services and local communities, as well as encouraging local people and communities to talk to each other, share skills/ideas and work together where appropriate.

The Forums aim to bring together the right people at the right time. They do not replace the rights of parish councils and key stakeholders to input into statutory consultations. However they do provide a mechanism for discussion, influence and prioritising what matters most.

#### 2. Progress so far

The development of each Forum is at different stages. This is due to previous partnership arrangements in place, a legacy of regeneration partnerships and local representation on the 'Local Strategic Partnership'. Bath and Bathavon Forum are currently being developed and will be formally established by Autumn 2015.

A rationalisation of other meetings has also taken place. Parish Cluster meetings, which were designed only for Parish Councils to attend and PACT meetings, run by Avon and Somerset Constabulary, have now been disbanded. Issues raised at these meetings can now be raised at the informal session run at the start of each Forum meeting.

A series of workshops was held in July 2015 for Bathavon, Chew Valley, Keynsham and Somer Valley. The aim of these was to help the Forums consider different ways of working together, a better understanding of what partners can offer and review the influence and effectiveness of the Forums for the future.

The outcomes of the workshops have been worked up into a series of action plans (see Section 4 below 'Action Planning') and draw together previous discussions held by previous partnership arrangements. The action plans will help each Forum focus on what really matters most and help them work together to solve these issues.

#### 3. About each Forum

A series of area profiles have been developed for each of the five areas. This brings together the key facts from the 2011 census data. Each profile provides a snapshot of the local population, how it lives and its characteristics and helps provide a better understand of the area. As new data becomes available each profile will be updated to reflect the current situation.

**Bath** - The Bath Area consists of sixteen electoral wards. Unlike North East Somerset, the Bath Area does not have parishes or parish councils. It has a resident population of 88,859. It lies 12 miles south-east of Bristol, near the southern edge of the Cotswolds, in a valley of the River Avon, designated as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. **Bathavon** - The Bathavon area consists of 3 electoral wards and 21 parishes and has a usual resident\* population of just over 12,600. Geographically it surrounds Bath City and borders South Gloucestershire to the North, Wiltshire to the West and Mendip to the South. The area is largely rural and home to a number of villages. Chew Valley - The Chew Valley Area consists of four electoral wards and 14 parishes, and has a resident population of about 9,983. The Chew Valley lies to the west of Bath and North East Somerset, and has strong links to Bristol. It is a large rural area and identified as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. One of its key features is the Chew Valley Lake, an important site for wildlife which has been dedicated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest and a Special Protection Area. **Keynsham Area** - Keynsham Area consists of seven electoral wards; one town and seven parishes, and has a resident population of about 24,692. It lies to the north of Bath and North East Somerset, and has strong links to both Bristol and Bath. The largest of the areas, Keynsham, is a market town, which serves a number of the nearby villages. One of its key features is that the physical geography is influenced by the two rivers, Avon and Chew, which converge to the north of the town. Historically the rivers were used as a transport corridor, now the A4 from Bath to Bristol provides the principle vehicular route for the area. Further information can be found at:

**Somer Valley** - Somer Valley Area consists of eight electoral wards; two towns and six parishes, and has a resident population of about 39,848. It lies to the south of Bath and North East Somerset and has close links with Mendip. The area has strong historical characteristics from a Medieval Market town to the transformation during the industrial revolution. The strength in community and historical identity remains strong. The industrial landscape has been returned to countryside, and the former Somerset and Dorset Railway route provides a cycling route for access to Bath and Frome. #### 4. Action Planning

A series of workshops were held in July 2015 for Bathavon, Chew Valley, Keynsham and Somer Valley Forum areas. The workshops were run and managed by Independent Facilitators, Rowena Harris and Diana Godwin.

Each workshop included a briefing by Cllr Tim Warren, Leader of the Council and Cabinet Member for Communities and Cllr Martin Veal, Cabinet Member for Community Services about the Council's priorities and future financial challenges.

The workshops were divided into three parts and Forum members were asked to participate in each.

- 1. **What's already happening?** inform others in the area about things planned or sharing best practice.
- What issues concern you now and what ideas do you have to make a change? – issues that matter most and ideas to make a change. These were sorted into a series of topics.
- 3. **Action planning** put forward proposals that they wished to discuss further within a small group and agree actions to take forward outside of the meeting.

Detailed notes and actions agreed at each workshop were written up by the Facilitators.

A number of priorities that were identified had a common theme across all Forums areas - the need for increased information sharing and improved community engagement. These are summarised as follows:-

Future formats for Forum meetings

- Increase community involvement in the Forum including local residents and young people
- Training and development for new Parish Councillors & Clerks
- Improve communication between: public services and parish councils; police and residents; parishes council and residents; utilities, highways and the local community and across Forum areas

Other shared issues raised across all the Forum areas included:

- **Children & Young People:** improve the provision of services and facilities for young people.
- **Development and Infrastructure:** ensure the impact of development maintains the identity of the towns, villages and rural setting and ensure sufficient improvements to infrastructure.
- Environmental, Sustainability and Climate Change: encourage sustainable energy better understanding of the benefits and opportunities for environmental sustainability initiatives.
- Health & Wellbeing: increase access to and information about services available.
- **Transport**: the need for affordable and accessible public transport; more community transport solutions; reduction in speeding and volume of traffic and; improved engagement in highway maintenance programmes.

It is recognised that whilst these priorities and common issues are shared across all Forum areas, the action needed may differ dependent upon the needs of each Forum and therefore have been dealt with separately in each Action Plan.

There was one priority that requires discussion across the whole area; the need to improve communication, training and development for new parish councillors and clerks. The action required is detailed below:-

DD introduced the Police and Communities Together (PACT) process. He welcomed Constable Mike Bolwell, the Beat Manager for Peasedown St John and Paulton, who gave the following update:-

- Crime trends only one dwelling burglary in the area; no distraction burglaries; four non-dwelling burglaries.
- In terms of road safety, 140 cars were pulled in the previous day as part of an educational exercise. Most were related to the use of mobile phones while driving, not wearing a seatbelt, incorrect use of child seats, headlights out etc.
- On 20<sup>th</sup> February, a new Community Speedwatch will start in Frome Road, Radstock. There are now 18 Speedwatch locations in the area. This is welcomed as Police resources are dwindling.
- There was an incident of cannabis being grown in Radstock but this has been dealt with

MB reminded those present of the importance of reporting crime, even if it is minor anti-social behaviour such as door-knocking.

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#### **Questions and Answer Session**

- Q: Has there been a reduction in the number of PCSOs in Midsomer Norton as they seem less visible? Submitted in advance by Cllr Barry Macrae, B&NES
- A: MB said the Midsomer Norton beat has been temporarily affected as one member of staff is off on long term sick leave and another is elsewhere at the present time. Sometimes a particular area needs more attention so there needs to be some flexibility. If Midsomer Norton was experiencing high levels of anti-social behaviour for example, support could be drawn in from another area.
- Q: What is the Police's view on the 20mph zones are they causing problems? Maureen Ince, Resident
- A: MB said in terms of 20mph signs, those with a red background are enforceable and those with green advisory. It can be difficult for motorists to do 20mph in some areas unless they are narrow, have speed humps etc. If people are visible with a speed-gun, it tends to slow the traffic down.
- Q: There is a 20mph limit in Charlton Road but should this only apply to Westfield as Midsomer Norton opted not to have 20mph zones when consulted. Was a mistake made in terms of location, or was a Cabinet decision overturned? Cllr Paul Myers, B&NES
- A: DD said he would ask Highways and report back (Action DD)
- Q: Residents are concerned about parking on junctions with no restrictions and requesting more double yellow lines. What is the advice? Cllr Paul Myers, B&NES
- A: MB said the Police get daily complaints about this and will leaflet households occasionally. If they see poor parking and can identify the owner of the vehicle, they will follow up.

1.	Welcome and Safety Announcement	
1.1	The Chair welcomed those present and a safety briefing was given.	
2.	Introductions and Apologies	
2.1	All introduced themselves. Apologies as above.	
3.	Minutes of the Last Meeting	
3.1	These were proposed by CLGM; seconded by TT and agreed as a true record by majority.	
4.	Matters Arising	
4.1	BMc asked whether the CCG had actioned 6.32 ie using 'Somer Valley' to refer to this area. TC said she has taken this suggestion back and there have been no objections. It has yet to be implemented formally.	
5.	Brief Update From Public Services	
5.1	DD said that there are representatives from the Police; Curo; Council and Clinical Commissioning Group present. Curo does not have an update for this meeting; the Police will say a few words and there will be a workshop with the CCG later in the Agenda. Those present are welcome to ask strategic questions of these organisations but individual/local questions should be posed at the informal session before the main meeting.	
5.2	MB gave the same Police update as in the informal session above.	
5.3	BMc asked whether the 20mph limit and PCSO questions had been dealt with in the informal session. It was confirmed that they had.	
6.	Your Care Your Way – B&NES Clinical Commissioning Group	
6.1	DD introduced Mike MacCallam, Senior Commissioning Manager for the Council and Clinical Commissioning Group. MMc thanked the Forum for this opportunity to engage with them on the start of their community planning.	
6.2	He said 'Your Care Your Way' relates to health care services received outside of hospital. This includes the social care that helps to keep people living in their own homes for as long as possible.	
6.3	The aim of the exercise is to help the CCG to plan services over the next 5 – 7 years that reflect the needs of the local community. It is not about re-commissioning or re-tendering sayie 58 but reviewing them. The wheel	

	on slide 4 of the presentation helps to explain the range of services people receive at home, or in a local care setting.	
6.4	The CCG has already been informed by local people that they want to be able to 'tell their story once'. So the sharing of information and use of technology is an important part of the review.	
6.5	A large part of B&NES is rural and there are areas of social deprivation. How can people best access the health care services they need in these circumstances?	
6.6	The Somer Valley has an ageing population and low unemployment but there is above average economically inactive, which could indicate retirement. 55% of people claiming job seekers allowance have a mental or behavioural disorder.	
6.7	The review will be undertaken in four stages. This is stage 1 and will run until April 2017.	
	Questions and Answers	
6.8	AMS said the law has changed so there is a need to provide for carers and the cared for equally. The CCG makes provision for older people but in Radstock there are high numbers of infants/young people – what is being done for them? MMc said this is a 'cradle to grave' review.	
6.9	BMc said the information is useful but there needs to be direct comparisons. TC said in respect of child obesity two figures are available – one is the national statistic, the other is by Local Authority. They use these. SA said the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) is available on the Council's website and it is possible to compare statistics for the Somer Valley with national figures and with other parts of B&NES.	
6.10	JB asked how long this consultation will take - the problems have been outlined but not the next steps. MMc said there will be four phases – this one is about gathering information and engagement with local people to obtain their views/experiences. They will be mapping groups that can feed in, such as the Connecting Communities Forums and other network groups. At the end of stage one the challenge will be how to shape what the CCG has been told and how radical changes need to be.	
6.11	MI asked what is happening to the Royal National Hospital for Rheumatic Diseases (RNHRD)? TC said the CCG wants to provide more services to local communities. There is currently a pilot programme in place around diabetes – if this goes well, it will be the model for other services. The acquisition of the RNHRD is around stability and continuity of service. The aspiration is to make more services available in local communities. MI said that some specialist services cannot be delivered in this way. TC agreed.	
6.12	LR said she understands the stages but asked how changes will be financed. TC said it is a challenge and providers will increasingly be expected to deliver efficiencies. The assumption is that if the right care is available in the right place, then it will help with savings.	
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6.13	CLGM said there is room for education about health. Lack of knowledge around the most appropriate solutions to colds, weight gain, etc puts pressure on health care services. TC said society is over reliant on health care services and there is a need for local people to take more responsibility and ownership of the cause of some of their problems. One of the elements of the diabetes pilot is to improve self care.	
6.14	TT asked whether the CCG will have any influence on the Local Authority to build more over 60s accommodation. MMc said there is a review of Health and Social Care, so it's not just about the role of the CCG. There is a good track record of joint working with the Council but the key is how we engage with other partners and organisations on the issues.	
6.15	SA said Placemaking is the key document in which to make these comments. The Council is planning for it and speaking with GPs regarding housing needs. The more groups like this that feed into Placemaking, the better.	
6.16	JH said dementia is a big issue. She asked how stakeholders that are losing their faculties can engage in exercises like this? TC said dementia is one of the CCG's key priorities and a national priority. There is a team at the RUH with dedicated staff and support workers. The Red Cross will also be piloting a project funded by Land Rover to put people in contact with activities and this is due to start in Midsomer Norton soon. AMS said Radstock Town Council has just voted for Radstock to be a Dementia Friendly Town and would like to be put in touch with the Red Cross.	CCG
6.17	SA said it is about making local communities friendlier to people with dementia and ensuring that shop workers etc get training to learn more about it. There are also books and resources relating to dementia in local libraries.	
6.18	TC introduced the workshop session which would be based around case studies. She asked the meeting to break into groups. Each would consider one study and what works well in terms of the services currently available and the key things that might make a difference.	
	Cllr Bob Hitchens, High Littleton Parish Council, left the meeting at this point.	
6.19	All groups provided feedback. This was recorded and will be sent out by the CCG at a later date but a précis will be sent out with the minutes as a separate document.	AW
6.20	MMc said maximising the role of volunteers, transport information and sign-posting were all common themes from the Forums to date.	
6.21	MMc asked everyone involved with the Forum to help promote the consultation – leaflets were distributed. Also, to let the CCG about groups in their area that they should be visiting.	ALL
7.	Action Planning	
7.1	DD said there are currently three Forums (Chew Valley; Keynsham and Somer Valley). There will soon be a fourth for Bathavon and options for a	

	mechanism for Bath are being discussed. One of the key roles for these Forums is how to influence public service plans. Two papers relating to this were circulated with the papers (i) a list of topics and consultations that have either been brought forward by public services for the Forums to engage with, or have been suggested by Forum members and (ii) options on the best way to approach action planning to help identify priorities for the Forum area.	
7.2	All Forum members are asked to consider these and feedback (i) any agenda items they would like to see included, not already covered and (ii) their views on the best approach to take on action planning.	
7.3	All the Forums are considering similar papers and the responses will be discussed by the Chairs, Vice Chairs and Sponsors of the Forums at a joint meeting at the end of March.	
7.4	BMc said this needs to be two way, with the issues that matter to local people coming forward. DD said the Agenda Plan is draft and is simply an outline of what public services have coming up. We welcome feedback but this will need to be e-mailed as the Forum will not meet again until the Summer to allow for the election to take place and new administrations to settle in.	ALL
7.5	JB said he missed the last meeting but was at one where a request was made to discuss Tourism. He would like this on the Agenda Plan.	AW
7.6	TT thanked everyone for attending and the Midsomer Norton Community Trust for organising the meeting, refreshments and audio visual arrangements.	
8.	Future Agenda Items	
8.1	This was discussed as part of Agenda Item 7.	
9.	Date of Next Meeting	
9.1	It was explained that there would be no Forum meetings in the Pre- election Period. They will reconvene in Summer 2015.	

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
