




Challenges remain in Bath

What's in the Strategy

- 1. That a strong emphasis should be given to **reducing the impact of vehicles**
- 2. That **walking** be given highest priority in the strategy.
- 3. That consideration for the needs of **people with mobility impairments** is regarded as a core element of the strategy
- 4. Vehicle movement should be better managed to reduce traffic impact
- 5. That **cycling** be promoted through better cycling routes
- 6. The **Enterprise Area** is developed as part of an integrated approach with strong sustainable transport links to the city centre and rail stations.
- 7. Car parking the policy of reducing central area public parking and expanding long stay capacity at Park and Ride sites should continue,



- 14. That **freight movements** be considered more fully, particularly to promote consolidation of deliveries and reduce the impact of HGV's.







Item 3 - Quality Contract Scheme for Buses – short update on current situation

- Council decided on 15 January 2015 to ask the Planning, Transport and Environment Policy Development and Scrutiny Panel to undertake further work into the potential, including advantages and disadvantages, for a quality contract scheme (QCS) in B&NES with a report back to the new Council at the meeting immediately following the Annual meeting in 2015.
- 2. A QCS is an intervention in the commercial market for under which a local transport authority (LTA) assumes responsibility for planning and specifying bus routes, timetables, fares and vehicle quality within its area.
- 3. Although powers to make QCSs were established in the Transport Act 2000, only one LTA has embarked on the lengthy process of setting one up the North East Combined Authority, which covers the urban area around Newcastle-upon-Tyne and Sunderland. NECA's proposals are being considered by a statutory board set up for that purpose.
- 4. In the Queen's Speech on 27 May 2015, the Government announced that new legislation in the current session of Parliament would include a Buses Bill to "provide the option for combined authority areas with directly-elected Mayors to be responsible for the running of their local bus services."
- 5. In the Government's view, the main benefits of the Bill would be:
 - (i) Providing the option to franchise bus services to areas willing to strengthen their governance with a directly-elected Mayor;
 - (ii) Supporting a thriving local bus market with the passenger at its centre:
 - (iii) Allowing cities to promote an integrated transport system, supporting the growth and development of their areas.
- The previous Government had already indicated that it would give bus franchising powers to the Greater Manchester Combined Authority as part of the devolution deal announced in late 2014.
- 7. Although the Buses Bill has not yet been drafted, it is anticipated that it will enable LTAs that have the required governance to franchise the bus network along similar lines to Transport for London (TfL). It is not

- known whether or not the existing powers to make QCSs will remain alongside the new powers.
- 8. In London, the Mayor publishes a Transport Strategy and determines the level of fares. TfL is responsible for implementing that strategy and is funded appropriately.
- 9. It is anticipated that franchising will offer a more permanent arrangement than a QCS and that the set-up process will be quicker and less bureaucratic. For these reasons, other Combined Authorities have expressed interest in taking on bus franchising powers as part of devolution settlements.
- 10. Cornwall Council has asked for bus franchising powers as part of a devolution package.
- 11. In the light of the developments and the emerging legislation, I recommend that the Panel defer consideration of a quality contract scheme for the time being.

Some background...

- » Gambling Act 2005 consolidated and updated previous legislation
- » In 2012, 28 million people participated in some form of gambling...many remotely by phone or internet
- » Local authorities regulate non-remote gambling i.e. premises based gambling

The role of local licensing authorities

- » Setting local framework through statement of principles and policy (reviewed every 3 years)
- » Consider applications and issue licences, with conditions if necessary
- » Review or revoke licences
- » Issue permits for some forms of gambling
- » Inspections and enforcement activities



What are the licensing objectives?

- » Preventing gambling from being a source of crime or disorder, being associated with crime or disorder, or being used to support crime;
- » Ensuring that gambling is conducted in a fair and open way;
- » Protecting children and other vulnerable persons from being harmed or exploited by gambling;



What gambling premises do we have?

- » 1 casino premises licence
- » 1 racetrack premises licence
- » 14 betting shop premises licences
- » 17 club gaming machine permits
- » 98 licensed premises gaming machine permits
- » No complaints received about any premises since last review

How are we going to consult about our policy?

- » 12 week consultation period
- » via consultation portal on Council's website http://www.bathnes.gov.uk/consultations/gambling-act-2005-statement-principles
- » Responsible authorities contacted e.g. Police, HM Revenue and Customs



The Democratic process

- » Policy will be reviewed by Policy Development and Scrutiny Panel
- » Brought back to Licensing Committee in October 2015 for recommendation to proceed to Full Council decision
- » Adoption in November 2015 by Full Council


What's new about this Act?





Public Space Protection Orderconsultation on banning amplification from busking

- » Since 2009, 279 complaints of amplified music from busking
- » Common challenge- unreasonable use of amplification by buskers
- » Environmental Protection Act 1990 is not best suited to deal with problem




Public Space Protection Orderthe consultation















Busker complaints 2014-15





Public Space Protection Orderthe current situation

- » 38 complaints since 01/01/15 compared to 97 at this point in 2014
- » 3 CPN warning letters issued; 1 CPN issued
