Strategy / Diversity of Entertainments on Offer	CD 5.3.1 The development of evening/nightime economy issues is not expected to take the form of a "strategy". It is being discussed as part of city centre issues, and has been raised by me with independent retailers, chamber of commerce and other forums and stakeholders in the general context of retail/visitor "offer".	
	The key is to encourage middle-aged and more sober people to remain in Bath after working hours. For this to work they have to be given something to do, such as more "gentle" forms of entertainment, or later opening of shops, and so on. Needless to say, this will not happen by central planning.

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	2 The Council's night-time economy strategy and use of planning and licensing powers should encourage a better balance and diversity in the late night economy. There should be a move away from the current dominance of activities involving alcohol and towards activities for a broader range of interests and age-groups including options not involving alcohol. 	The Council's Revised Deposit Local Plan, approved by Council July 03, considers the evening/night economy under the heading 'Uses appropriate in city and town centres'. Policy S.6 states that 'Proposals for A3 uses, including variations to existing consents, within and adjoining Bath central shopping area will only be permitted where they preserve or enhance the character of that part of the Conservation Area and they do not have an unacceptable impact of the amenity of residential occupiers.' The A3 use class includes pubs, clubs, restaurants and cafes. The reasoned justification for this policy recognises the risk of an over-concentration of such uses in the city centre, and the need to safeguard residential amenity by, for example, restricting the type of operation or its hours.	
	Further revision to this policy may result from consideration of representations on the revised deposit draft plan or further government guidance, and will be brought again to full Council this summer.

5.4 Taxis & buses	1 The Council Executive should work to ensure that people can get quickly and safely out of the city late at night. 	SEJ 5.4.1 The Transportation Dept will have discussions with bus companies about late night buses but I must point out that these are private companies. Unless (a) the demand is regularly there (b) that they can overcome the problems they could face from some of these users it is difficult to see development in this direction. It should also be born in mind that the possible users come from a wide geographical area. I don't know if there is any mileage in discussing this with the owners of bars and clubs to see if they felt able to subsidize any kind of late night service? Firstly, a new anti-social behaviour co-ordinator, Gaynor Kinnersley, has been appointed to serve Bath and North East Somerset (BANES). Gaynor has taken up the post on behalf of BANES Community Safety Partnership – which draws on the support of Bath Police, BANES Council, Somer Housing and BANES Youth Offending Team. Her role is to drive the programme which addresses anti social behaviour problems, which will help make BANES a safer and better place to live, work and visit.  Secondly, police in Bath, as part of their highly successful Operation Exuberant campaign, are planning to tackle anti social behaviour in the city centre by adopting the football referee warning cards. The patrols will crack down on begging; urinating in public; swearing; fighting and drinking on the street.
