MIDSOMER NORTON YOUTH HUB OUTREACH PROJECT (MSN-Y-HOP)

Consultation Report – May 2017

1: Background

The Norton Youth Club (NYC) is a joint programme run by three partners – Midsomer Norton Town Council, Midsomer Norton Community Trust and the Wansdyke Play Association. Thus far the Town Council having identified a need for a safe space for children and young people to meet has provided funding for financial years 2015/16, 2016/17 and with further funding earmarked for 2017/18.

The Midsomer Norton Community Trust (MNCT) has a range of buildings, a strong volunteer base and connections to the local community. As such it is ideally suited to facilities managing the two sea containers it is proposed are purchased to create two new outreach youth hubs in the town located at Orchard Vale and Gullock Tyning.

The Wansdyke Play Association (WPA) has extensive experience and skills in working with children, young people and families in the surrounding area.

In short the partnership has proved a great success, being able to build a thriving youth club night on a Thursday in the Town Hall as well as a range of exciting outreach initiatives and events. The two main partners are also keen to call on the skills and services of other service providers such as Off The Record, which currently has a highly effective youth counselling programme at the Town Hall on a Thursday evening.

The partnership is now looking to develop a three year plan which builds on its strengths and the work so far

2: Consultation

The partners carried out a two stage consultation as follows:

- 11 sessions December 2016 to February 2017 at the NYC Questionnaire Based 109 regular users
- 11th May 2017 Face to face interviews at the Midsomer Norton Skate Park 52 young people


2:1 NYC Consultation

This consultation was based on a simple A4 page single sided written questionnaire which attendees at the Norton Youth Club (NYC) completed in sessions between December 2016 and February 2017. The resulting 109 completed surveys completed over the 11 weeks were collated and the following conclusions drawn (full results spread sheet is attached in Appendix 1).

In terms of participants there were 109 in total of which 55 were male and 54 were female representing the makeup of the regular attendees to the NYC. The average age was 13 years ranging from the youngest at 11 to the oldest at 15.

The first question sought to establish where young people hang out. The Skate Park scored the highest at 41 out of 109 – it's clearly the most popular place to 'hang out'.

Although the survey was carried out at the NYC in the Town Hall, only 16 out of the 109 stated that the NYC was where they 'hung out'. However, whilst there is a growing attendance at the NYC it is only open one night a week and in term time whereas the other areas are available seven days a week all year round. That said these young people who referred to the NYC tended to avoid the public places like the Skate Park as the further results show below.

When asked where they would like to go but couldn't – of the 44 people who stated a preferred place, 22 wanted somewhere that was broadly inside where they could sit that was warm and dry which was significant.

When asked if they used the Skate Park 66 out of the 97 who answered the question confirmed they did. Of the 31 who didn't use the Skate Park it is significant that feedback on the reasons why indicated that they did not feel safe due to the presence of drug related activities or bullying (referred to by 11 of 66). This points to a need to address this issue with enforcement.

When it came to the activities that young people would like to do, of the 32 that expressed a preference 17 (more than half) wanted more activities for young people and 20 wanted a place to meet and socialise such as a Youth Café or as a minimum somewhere warm and dry. There were even references to the young people wanting to help run a café.

2:2 Skate Park Consultation

Following a rise in antisocial behaviour in Gullock Tyning a further consultation was carried out on the 11th May 2017, led by the Town Mayor, Cllr Paul Myers and Siobainn Chaplin of Off The Record. Given the obvious synergy with the original core survey the results are included here. For this session which lasted 5 hours, the questionnaire format simply didn't work and so one simple question was posed – How could things be improved for young people in Midsomer Norton?

The results were interesting.


- 31% (16 out of 52) wanted somewhere to go where they could chill described in most cases as a Youth Café.
- 25% (13 out of 52) wanted more activities either in the Skate Park or in a space in the town.
- 12% (6 out of 52) wanted the Skate Park improved with floodlighting or a cover.

It was marked that when it came to litter the young 6 referred to either the need for more bins, for them to be emptied more regularly or for the horticulture maintenance to be improved.

The full results are summarised in Table 2a, presented as a Pie Chart in 2b with full responses summarised in Table 2c below.
