Fixed Penalty Notices for Environmental and Anti-Social Behaviour Offences

The Issue	The Environmental Offences (Fixed Penalties) (Amendment) (England) Regulations 2023 came into force on the 31st July 2023. These regulations have empowered local authorities to increase the penalties issued under Fixed Penalty Notices (FPN) for the unauthorised or harmful deposit, treatment or disposal of waste, duty of care for household waste and in relation to anti-social behaviour offences. This legislative change has prompted a review of the level of FPN penalty for all environmental crime offences and for anti-social behaviour offences enforced by BANES, with the aim of the penalty amounts acting as a deterrent to offending.
