BWR Ph II is a key regeneration priority for the council, forming the principal pipeline opportunity for B&NES to achieve its affordable housing targets. Delivering the Right Houses in the Right Place: The Council has a manifesto commitment to deliver hundreds of Council homes by 2027 and over a thousand units by 2030. BWR Ph II will enable the council to deliver housing to meet local need via the provision of both open market and affordable housing. It aims to maximise the provision of affordable housing and has been designed to accommodate approximately 30% affordable homes, of which 75% are social rent and 25% are shared ownership, subject to additional grant funding. Leading the UK in Climate and Nature Actions: BWR Ph 2 is designed with exceptional building performance standards based on Passivhaus principals and utilising a fabric first approach. It promotes low car and low energy use in line with B&NES ambition to be net zero by 2030. Transport: Enabling Sustainable Choices: BWR Ph 2 has been designed to enable and encourage sustainable transport | | |

| | | modes including active travel. A Sustainable Transport Route (STR) will be provided through the BWR Ph 2 site. The STR will be an east west corridor connecting Windsor Bridge Road and Midland Road designed to prioritise active and sustainable modes of travel in accordance with the road user hierarchy. The BWR Ph II project is managed by the B&NES Housing team. |

According to the 2021 Census data, a population of 7,524 resided in the Westmoreland Ward. On average, the ward experienced an annual population increase of 2.9% between 2011 and 2021. |
