Introduction

Following the 2026-2027 BANES Mainstream Schools Funding Consultation – Autumn 2025, that was completed on 14th of November 2025, the forum is asked to comment on schools' responses and to decide on planned actions for the National Funding Formula (NFF) for 2026-2027. The DfE released the 2026-27 provisional allocations for the schools and central school services blocks on the 19th of November 2025, the Forum is asked to consider the approach to be adopted and provide a steer to the LA on how to allocate funding to mainstream schools in 2026-27.

Recommendation

The Forum is asked to:

- 1) Comment on the responses to the consultation and recommend to the cabinet member the preference the forum would like to take with regard to the details of the NFF.
- 2) Decide on whether the LA should introduce a cap on gains for 2026-27 to restrict schools with the largest gains to balance the schools block allocation or scale back the value of all eligible factors, should the Should resources allocated by the DfE for the LA schools block not be sufficient to support the NFF in full and
- 3) Decide on the request to support the continued 0.5% contribution from the Schools Block to the High Needs Block for 2026-2027
- 4) Decide on the level of Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG) for 2026-27

Report

The 2026-27 BANES mainstream schools funding consultation document was emailed to the schools on the 14th of October 2025 to communicate proposed formula changes for 2026-2027 and covered the following 3 main topics.

- A. Proposed changes to the school's formula for 2026-2027 that will be used to fund all mainstream schools and academies
- B. Should resources allocated by the DfE for the LA schools block not be sufficient to support the NFF in full, should the LA either
 - introduce a cap on gains for 2026-27 to restrict schools with the largest gains to balance the schools block allocation? or
 - scale back the value of all eligible factors?

C. Continuation of utilisation of school block resources to support High Needs

Set out below for each of these topics is the decision-making powers and the required actions by the schools Forum.

The Formula for 2026-2027 and LA's moving to a 'direct' NFF.

As in previous years, each local authority will continue in consultation with maintained schools and academies, to set a local schools funding formula in 2026-27, to calculate the distribution of funding available for mainstream schools.

Local authorities will be required to move their local formulae factors 10% closer to the NFF values, compared to where they were in 2025-26, unless they are already mirroring the NFF. BANES is deemed to be mirroring the NFF.

The BANES Autumn 2025 consultation document set out the DfE confirmed technical changes in the NFF, announced in June 2025, and the LA proposed changes in the local authority school's formula for 2026-27 that will be used to fund all BANES mainstream schools. The consultation also discussed the approach to be adopted should resources allocated by the DfE for the LA schools block not be sufficient to support the NFF in full and the continuation of the utilisation of school block resources to support the high needs block.

The Forum is asked to recommend a course of action to the Cabinet Member for Children and Young People for the following two areas.

A. Proposed changes to the school's formula for NFF for 2026-27

If you look at **Appendix 5.1** you will see all the schools' responses to the questions in the consultation, and some have shared their opinions.

The school's forum is asked to steer LA officers with regard to the detail of the formula as follows:

1. Following the responses received from the consultation the Forum is asked to steer officers to follow the NFF in line with the allocations provided by the DfE, in particular the allocation of the funding of the rolled in grants.
2. If the final schools block allocation by the DfE for 2026-27, is not sufficient to support the allocation of the NFF in full, do the forum agree that LA Officers should scale back the eligible NFF factor values by a relevant percentage to balance the overall schools funding formula allocation to the resources available. In Line with the methodology used in the past 3 years.

B. Utilising Schools Block funding for High Needs

For 2026-27 Local authorities will continue to be able to transfer up to 0.5% of their school's block funding into the high needs block with school's forum approval. Transfers above 0.5%, or any amount without school's forum approval will require Secretary of State Approval even if ministers agreed the same amount in the past two years.

The LA consulted on the transfer of 0.5% from the school's block to the High Needs Block from 2018-19 to 2025-26 and, following consultation, which the school's forum agreed. The resources that transferred in 2025-26 were £723,527.

The LA consulted with schools in autumn 2025 to ask if they agree to extend the current arrangement to transfer 0.5% of the school's block to the high need block for 2026-27 and **100% of the schools** that responded to the consultation **agreed to this proposal**.

The autumn 2025 consultation responses can be viewed at **Appendix 5.1**

The Forum is asked to decide whether to approve a 0.5% transfer of school's block funding to the High Need Budget for 2026-2027. The actual amount to be transferred cannot be accurately calculated as we have not been given our allocation for 2026-27. However, the LA has estimated £766,910 for this purpose based on the provisional allocation.

If the Forum turns down the proposal to transfer any funding from the school's block to the high needs block the LA can request Secretary of State Approval under the Financing of Schools Regulations.

Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG)

The policy document issued by the DFE in the summer and our resultant consultation made no mention of the levels of the MFG for 2026-27. The provisional allocations issued last week allow a MFG between minus 0.5% per pupil and 0% per pupil.

As we have not consulted on this issue we need to request that the forum recommends to the council what approach it would like to be considered.

In previous years the consultation and approach by the council was to follow a principle of protecting schools to budgetary changes as much as possible. The resultant approach was to protect schools to the highest MFG possible.

In the 2026-27 year this would set the rate 0% per pupil.

The forum is therefore asked to recommend to the council its preferred level for the Minimum Funding Guarantee.
